The buses are back!

...or at least, there's one a day each way, according to the new timetable. You can leave for Kirkby Lonsdale at about twenty past eight in the morning (0818 Gressingham, 0824 Arkholme, 0830 Whittington), and return from Kirkby Lonsdale at quarter to four (1545 Booths, 1548 Market Square), getting home just after 4pm. You can extend your trip to Hornby or Lancaster if you stay on the bus in the morning (arriving in Hornby at ten past nine or in Lancaster just after 9.30), but to get back from Lancaster you have to leave Lancaster at lunchtime (1315, or Hornby 1341), find something to do in KL for an hour and a half before joining the only bus home from KL at quarter to four. You can also use the same two buses to spend the night in Lancaster (or further afield): the four o'clock afternoon bus out (1554 Whittington, 1601 Arkholme, 1607 Gressingham) reaches Lancaster Bus Station at quarter to five, and the morning bus home leaves Lancaster at quarter to eight exactly, to get you home by half past eight. The buses run on school days only. Go to www.lancashire.gov.uk and in the search box type bus 81.

The internal audit had been completed.

Concluding our series on The Lord's Prayer: **Protect us from evil, temptation and harm**

For "lead us not into temptation", the best modern translations have "do not bring us to the time of trial".

Translation is a complex art. God does not lead us into temptation – in the original Greek, or in daily life; and Jesus will have first spoken the prayer in Aramaic anyway.

We pray that God would *deliver us from evil* – wherever we may encounter it – and also save us from *'testing times'*.

Luke has a shorter, earlier version of the Lord's Prayer; the familiar text is Matthew's. But the conclusion is a later addition to both – in which we offer to God our hearts and our lives, acknowledging God as Lord of all.

The familiar text:
Our Father, who art in heaven:
hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come, thy will be done,
on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread,
and forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive those
who trespass against us.
And lead us not into temptation,
but deliver us from evil;
for thine is the kingdom,
the power, and the glory,
for ever and ever. Amen.

The shorter version in Saint Luke: Father (holy is your name): may your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread, and forgive us our sins, as we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us. And do not bring us to the time of trial.

Concluding our five-part series:

Our sustainer in the skies, our nourisher and upholder, ground of all being, sum of all that is divine, present in every breath we take, beyond words, beyond description, beyond imagination: may the values of freedom and community, the good of all humankind, and the good of all creation, be known throughout the earth. May there be bread today for all who are hungry, alone or afraid. Heal the sores of the wrongs we have done, as we also learn to love and to heal those who may have trespassed against us. Protect us from evil, temptation, and harm; Lord of creation, and Lord of our lives.

Rainfall in the year 2016

Of the 366 days of 2016, 127 (35%) were completely dry, and the 239 Rain Days produced 1251mm of rain (49.3 inches). Of the 239 Rain days, 91 qualified as Decidedly Wet Days (5mm or more), and of those 91, just two qualified as Extremely Wet Days (25mm or more).

November was much wetter than the very dry October, and the rains brought an acceleration of leaf fall, which quickly blocked roadside drains and roof gutters. The cloud kept dawn temperatures above freezing on many days, but there were modest frosts for a week from the 8th, and some sharper ones in the week from the 24th.

The late November dry period ended on December 6th, but returned briefly on the 18th before the rains started again on the 20th, reaching a dismal total of 46mm spread from Dec 20th to Christmas Day. That was followed by some dry frosty (seasonal) days until Dec 31st brought a final flurry of rain.

The New Year has brought a mixed bag – some days wet and windy, but others calm and mostly cloudy, with an unremarkable accumulation of 44mm by January 16th.

The rainfall total for 2016 is moderately high at 1251mm, but mercifully well short of last year's deluvian 1541mm. It is interesting to note that the implied average daily rate of rainfall in the 239 days (see below) in which rain fell in 2016, was 5.2 mm, which is just into the category I call Decidedly Wet Days. In fact only 91 of those 239 rain days actually qualified as Decidedly Wet Days, so many of the 91 must have been well over the qualifying 5mm. In fact two of them qualified additionally as Exceptionally Wet Days (over 25mm, or 1 inch). They were measured on the morning of March 1 (35.4mm) and August 22 (37.4mm), and between them they accounted for 73mm, which is nearly 6% of the annual total. It's the familiar story - rainfall is heavily skewed towards small numbers of unusually heavy falls, which of course are hard to forecast, and hard to cope with when they come. I wish you a New Year with as few EWDs as possible.
