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Gressingham Pearson Trust Working Group Exhibition

























2pm to 6pm on Friday 21 April and Saturday 22 April and 5pm to 7pm on Sunday 23 April with open meeting with the architect in the school room from 7pm

The Pearson Trust Working Group is pleased to present a detailed exhibition on the work the group has been doing looking into the options suggested by the village as possible future uses for the Old School Room and the church.

The group managed to secure a £10,000 grant which has funded professional fees, including historical and structural surveys, heating assessments, and some early architectural design ideas for how the church could be adapted for future use. The architects have produced nine outline design ideas for providing new facilities on the church site, and all nine will be on display at the exhibition.

The group has also carried out extensive research into the history and legal status of the Old School Room, the ownership of which has been debated since the 1850s.

The exhibition and consultation is an opportunity to learn about the work that has been carried out, see the history going back and possible designs going forwards, and feed in your comments and questions. It will culminate on the Sunday evening with a meeting in the school room where the architect and all the members of the working group will be available to answer questions. Please do come to see the work that has been done so far and to help guide the next steps.

The exhibition venue has been changed from the school room to the church, to make it easier to visualise the various design ideas.

Arkholme Parish Council met on Mondays 6 March and 3 April. This year's Hopewell Cup competition will be a Traditional Style Cake Competition, incorporated with the School Sports Day, with three categories: adult male, adult female, and schoolchild. The Empty Homes Officer at Lancaster City Council has been informed about the state of disrepair of the farm house at Storrs Gate Farm. The clerk will inform the Planning Case Officer about the severe hedge pruning undertaken opposite Thorneys. Councillors agreed to donate £100 each to the Children's Sports Day, the Children's Party Committee, and Wagtail Playgroup. The annual £12 rent for each of the pounds had been collected and banked. The clerk will complete the Local Plan Consultation Response Form with councillors' comments regarding Arkholme being unsustainable for new development because of lack of facilities, and South Carnforth being in the designated greenbelt. Scaffolding at the West House development has been reconfigured so as not to block the pavement. Tree preservation orders were confirmed for trees between The Herb Garden and The Sheiling.

Whittington Parish Council held a special open meeting on Monday 6 March. Present were five Parish Councillors, the clerk, and forty-two members of the public. The Chairperson put the motion to parishioners that *This Parish Meeting confirms its* support of the Parish Council and the decisions made over the past 24 months. Various views and issues were put forward by parishioners and discussed at length. Support from parishioners was accepted with regard to fiscal maintenance, an official Whittington Village website being established, and improvement in communication and minute taking. The motion was carried with 39 votes in favour, one against, and two abstentions. The open meeting was closed and a Parish Council meeting followed. Councillors discussed alleged speeding of vehicles through the village. It was clarified that the increase in precept was not specifically for a Speed Indicator Device, and more information was needed. The Town Quarry gate has been repaired and the posts replaced. The litter-pick had been a success. There was still a dog-mess problem on public footpaths. Flytipping, potholes, water rising from a manhole, and the state of Hosticle Lane, were all reported to FixMyStreet. One bench repair was complete and another was pending. The meeting was adjourned, and continued on Wednesday 29 March, when plans were advanced for a new Parish Council website for the village. The future of bus service 81A is still undecided by Stagecoach, but Kikrby Lonsdale Coaches may be proposing an alternative service – details to be confirmed. Councillors made a grant of £50 to Wagtail parish magazine. The planning application for development behind the Dragons Head had been refused again; the application concerning the Old School was awaiting a decision. Next meeting Annual Parish Meeting 7pm on Monday 8 May, then Annual General Meeting 7pm on Monday 15 May.

March Weather in Arkholme

11 Slightly Wet Days (less than 5mm) together adding up to 21.8mm

10 Decidedly Wet Days (from 5mm to just under 25mm) together adding up to 88.1mm

0 Extremely Wet Days (25mm and over)

21 Rain Days in total adding up to **109.9mm** (4.3 inches) – leaving 10 dry days Wettest Day 18th-19th had 18.7mm

March came in with nearly 20mm of rain in the first four days, but then was much dryer until the rains restarted strongly on the 16th, adding nearly 70mm in the next eight days. Then it dried again before finishing the month with another 13 mm in the last four days. It was therefore a month of contrasts in rainfall, and associated weather, which makes a welcome change from months where the weather seems to get stuck in a rut. Afternoon temperatures moved around from modest values in the cloudy periods, to 17 and 17.5°C on the afternoons of the 25th and 26th. I recorded only two air frosts in the month - one on the morning of the 2nd and the other on the morning of the 25th. April has so far been extraordinarily dry, with only 12mm in the first eighteen days.

In lovely weather on the afternoon of Easter Monday (April 17th), a small group of us were strolling along the bridleway to the Arkholme-Melling viaduct, recovering from a splendid lunch. Suddenly we were sprinkled by smallish drops of rain falling from a nearly clear blue sky. The drops were about 1mm in diameter, and such drops fall at about 5 metres per second (roughly 10 mph), because that is the speed at which the pull of gravity is balanced by the frictional drag of the drop of that size falling through the air. At this rate they fall about 300m in a minute in quiet air, which means that they had probably been falling for about 10 minutes from their formation zone about 3,000 metres above our heads - not vertically above us, since the light northerly blowing at the time must have carried the drops about 2km southwards as they fell. So if, ten minutes before we were surprised by the "magic rain", we had had the prescience to look 2km to the north to a height of 3 Ingleboroughs, we might have seen the smallish cloud which grew the raindrops in the first place. But we didn't, and so we were surprised and teased because that particular cloud had evaporated by the time we were sprinkled. The sky was a picture anyway: the gloomy overcast of a weak front had been replaced in the early afternoon by a largely blue sky, to the north and west, dotted by these smallish clouds working their magic.

Scientists are getting excited about a moon of Saturn which may have conditions conducive to the development of life. I know I should be interested, but nothing could remotely compare with the Lune Valley on a fine Easter Monday, with Oystercatchers piping as they swerve over the viaduct, and mysterious raindrops falling on our heads.

By the end of March there have been 22 dry days in 2017, 48 Slightly Wet Days giving 70mm of rain, 10 Decidedly Wet Days giving 209mm and no Extremely Wet Days, a total of 68 Rain Days giving 279mm of rain.
